






CAREERS UPDATE

We are extremely excited to introduce our new careers hub here at Avonbourne. This is an exciting new space for all students and includes computers and laptops available for students to research and collaborate, a career related library and up to date sixth form, college, and university prospectus from around the country.

We are also thrilled to be able to offer all our Year 11 students the opportunity to have their own one to one career appointment. These are being rolled out over the next half term. This is an opportunity for our year 11 students to understand their options and clarify next steps and directions. Each student will receive an action plan following on from their appointment which is personalised to them.

In other careers news next half term, we will be welcoming into the school a number of speakers during assembly time across all year groups. This will include our local Apprenticeship Support & Knowledge for schools and colleges programme (ASK programme) who will be delivering an assembly on apprenticeship awareness to our Year 10 and Year 11's. We are also excited to welcome visits from Bournemouth University for our Year 7 to present a talk around what university is like and Bournemouth Arts University to present a Creative careers assembly to our Year 8 and year 9's.




RE

The start of the new academic year has seen the growth and expansion of the Religious Education at Avonbourne as we welcome Miss Khan and Miss Harris to the department. This term has also seen the continued, highly successful introduction of the new United Learning Religious Education curriculum into Year 9, after its integration, last year, into Years 7 and 8.

In Year 9 students have begun studying both absolutist and relativist ethical theories such as Natural Law, Situation and Utilitarianism. They have then been applying these theories to moral dilemmas such as the Trolley Problem, Driverless Cars and the case of Dudley and Stephens. Excitingly, after Christmas will see the introduction of Eastern Faiths into both the key stage three and key stage five school curriculum.

The RE department has continued to welcome the local Christian charity, 'The Pace Trust', into Year 7 lessons and the Wednesday Lunchtime club, 'Big Questions.' Welcoming Christians and non-Christians alike, 'Big Questions' offers students the opportunity to approach moral and ethical issues and perspectives of their own choosing, which may be different to those that they encounter within the Religious Education curriculum. This term, students have been discussing topical issues such as 'How do we know that God is real?', 'How is God all powerful if evil and suffering exist?' and 'What is gender?' The RE department have also started the extremely popular Tea Club during Tuesday lunchtimes where students get to sample and learn about a variety of unusual tea flavours from around the world.

Congratulations to 7AB1 and 7AG1 for achieving the most Reach points in RE so far this term and Chidalu E and Adrian I for achieving the most individual Reach points in RE over the past year. Finally, the RE department is now on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter with the username AvonbourneRE. All followers are welcome.



HISTORY



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It has been a fantastic start to the academic year in the history department, building on achieving record-breaking results at both GCSE and A-Level in the summer. This half term students have been studying:

§ Year 7: Worldviews- looking at how connected the world was in the year 1000 through the study of Constantinople, European Christendom and Baghdad

§ Year 8: Henry VIII and the Reformation- considering why England made the momentous 'break with Rome' in 1533.

§ Year 9: World War One- learning about why Europe went to war in 1914 and how it developed into a world war through the role of empires and studying the 'often forgotten soldiers'.

§ Year 10: have made an excellent start to their GCSE studies by exploring how medicine changed throughout the medieval and renaissance periods.

§ Year 11: are continuing on their pathway to success by examining the tensions in the Cold War period. 69 year 11 students are also very much looking forward to the Berlin Trip at October half term.

§ Year 12: have enjoyed studying the Russian Revolution and the policies of Lenin in addition to the origins of communism in China.

Extra-curricular: In the fortnightly KS3 history club students have been learning about different topics that staff are particularly passionate about, and the curriculum doesn't cover. First up was Miss Graham and the French Revolution, whilst last week students studied the partition of India and Pakistan with Mr Lavy. The new cohort of year 11 students have made a great start to Scholars' Lunch, so far discussing academic articles around the history of medicine topic. The history department continues to be very active on Instagram and now has over 300 followers- check us out for daily stories around on this day in history, local history, key messages, and anything else that we think our community will find interesting!



We have been reviewing our Art Curriculum and are pleased with the fantastic work being produced by students in all years. We try to ensure students have access to a wide range of materials in all year groups.

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On Wednesday 28th September, some of our Y10 students had the chance to meet a group of Spanish students. They gave them a tour of the school and shared a cream tea together, which was an enjoyable experience for all involved. Our students had the fantastic opportunity to practice their language skills outside the classroom and develop their understanding of cultural differences between the UK and Spain.

ENGLISH

We have been extremely impressed with Year 7 as they have stepped up to KS3 English with determination and enthusiasm. They have embraced the world of the brilliant Bronte sisters and have enjoyed applying their knowledge of context to their own writing. Year 8 and 9 have been analysing powerful poetry from a number of cultures, themes and styles. Additionally, students in Year 8 and 9 have been using Bedrock Learning, our homework platform, to extend their vocabulary. It has been a pleasure to witness how many students are applying this new vocabulary to their own writing and developing an academic style.

In Year 10, students have spent their first half-term studying their Shakespeare GCSE text Macbeth. Students have explored the themes of power, morality, ambition and deception, whilst analysing language and structure with depth and insight. Year 11 students have completed an in-depth study of An Inspector Calls, exploring the conventions of a morality play and the themes of class, wealth, responsibility and equality. Year 11 ended the term analysing a selection of Unseen poetry, cementing their knowledge of poetic devices and how these are utilised for meaning. Year 12 have made excellent progress with their full text study of Frankenstein, whilst Year 13 have nearly finished an analysis of Shakespeare's Othello, exploring the Jacobean fear of 'the other' and the devastating impact of jealousy and deception. Finally, we have been very busy this half-term preparing for the USF open evening that was held on Monday 17th October!

In GCSE Media Year 11 students are completing their creative coursework, which is worth 30% of their GCSE grade as well as exploring their detailed studies of British and American sitcoms. Year 10 students are analysing their advertising and marketing case studies and getting some hands-on experiences of the practical equipment as well as editing packages such as Premiere and Photoshop. Year 12 A Level Media students are developing their skills and confidence of applying academic theorists to their case studies of music videos and advertising campaigns from across the decades.
